

Inuit snow goggles

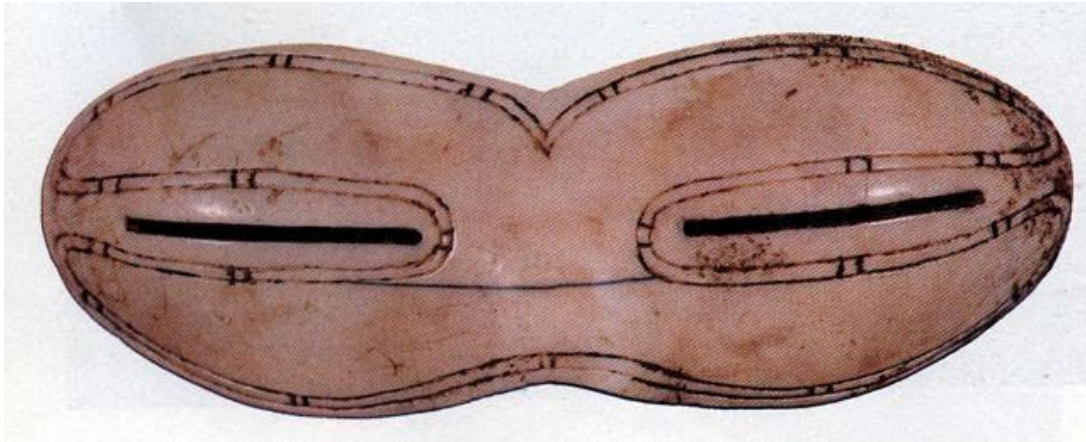

The Arctic is not only cold, but the snow is also blinding. To prevent snow glare, the Inuit created snow goggles. The goggles were typically made out of bone or wood, and contain a slit across the eyes, just large enough to see through.

Materials:

- Cardboard or felt
- Scissors
- Yarn
- Hole puncher

Directions:

Cut a piece of cardboard or felt so that it is 2 inches wide and long enough to cover the front of your child's face. Carefully measure and mark where your child's eyes and nose are. Cut out thin slits where the eyes should be, and create a notch for the nose. With a hole puncher, punch a hole into each end of the goggles. Tie the string through the holes. Have fun seeing through your new snow goggles!
